# Main objective of Dutch efforts in the period of 2019 - 2022\*:

In the future, trade and investment will set the tone in the relationship between the Netherlands and Rwanda, with emphasis on strengthening economic ties. Our development programme will therefore be gradually phased out, on the basis of an exit strategy.



### Integrated approach

In the coming years, the Netherlands' approach to Rwanda will change. Political cooperation however will continue to be of primary importance. The Netherlands and Rwanda have a close working relationship at the UN, thanks to Rwanda being one of the largest contributors of troops to UN missions, and join forces to protect civilians in conflict situations.




## Security and the rule of law
